Having the opportunity to witness the growth and formation of the young people we are entrusted with truly is our greatest gift.

Finding God in All Things

In his poem The Way It Is, poet William Stafford writes:

There's a thread you follow. It goes among things that change. But it doesn't change. People wonder about what you are pursuing. You have to explain about the thread. But it is hard for others to see. While you hold it you can't get lost. Tragedies happen; people get hurt or die; and you suffer and get old. Nothing you do can stop time's unfolding. You don't ever let go of the thread.



A grandparent of one of our school children recently asked me, "What makes a Jesuit education different from the education my grandson might receive in Public School or another Catholic Grade School?" I think there are threads that we find in the first sixty years of our School's existence that we will also find in the next sixty years of our School's existence. Six of those threads are aspects of St. Ignatius' spirit that foundationally shape the education your children and grandchildren receive at St. Ignatius Loyola Parish School.

The first thread is "finding God in all things." God is part of my everyday experience as a mother, as a father, as a grandparent, as a son or daughter, as a teacher or student, as a human being. In the most mundane daily tasks, I can encounter God. But if I don't expect this or look for this, I will never experience or find it.

The second thread is a Latin phrase cura personalis which means "care for the entire person." As Fr. Peter Hans Kolvenbach, the 29th General of the Jesuits, stated: "An education in the Jesuit tradition must involve the head, the heart and the hand." We challenge our students to be critical thinkers. We inspire our students to be compassionate and merciful. We teach our students that love expresses itself in service of others.

The third thread in another Latin word Magis. As our students grow in awareness that "all good gifts around us, are sent from heaven above," they also grow in gratitude. They are encouraged to be more, to hope more, to love more, to serve more. Consequently, our students not only grow in their capacity to be grateful but also to be generous with all the gifts they have received.

The fourth thread is discernment. A Jesuit education teaches students how to choose wisely between competing goods. Students in our school are given the tools to be good decision-makers.

The fifth thread is the service of faith and the promotion of justice. Our students learn that values, attitudes and beliefs are discovered in the actions we perform. If people want to discover who we are and what we value, all they have to do is look at how we use our time, our talent, and our treasure. Our students learn what Mother Teresa of Calcutta called "the gospel on five fingers—You-Did-It-To-Me."

The sixth thread is really the outcome of a Jesuit education—men and women for others.

So, in a nutshell, this is the type of education your children and grandchildren have received for the last sixty years at St. Ignatius Loyola Parish School and will be receiving for the next sixty years to come. Please join us this year in being "Grateful for Our Past and Hopeful in Our Future."

St. Ignatius Flourishes

EARLY LAST FALL, teachers, parents, priests and staff gathered in the Garden Room at the end of the WCEA/WASC Accreditation Panel's threeday visit to St. Ignatius Parish School. The panel of accomplished Catholic school professionals not affiliated with St. Ignatius was about to deliver its findings. Most, if not all, of the members of our community in attendance had spent countless hours the previous school year examining data, reading, writing, talking and listening to each other to assess every facet of our programs. From curriculum to what it means to be a Jesuit school, they committed themselves to identifying our greatest achievements as well as to setting new goals for the future. Our committees were proud of our school's accomplishments and optimistic about what the panel would have to say, but they were not fully prepared for what they heard that day.

Did the visitors' observations gel with the comprehensive report assembled by the St. Ignatius accreditation teams after their comprehensive study? Yes!

The visiting panel's leader, a principal from a Catholic school outside of the Diocese, who has coordinated more than 40 accreditation reviews, announced that St. Ignatius was by far the best school he had ever evaluated. He remarked that the daily work his team witnessed closely mirrored the comprehensive report that Principal Patty Kochis and the accreditation team put together in preparation. The other members of the panel affirmed the leader's assessment and raved about our school, even mentioning that they had collected plenty of notes to bring back to their own schools to implement change.

For three days the visitors had total access to the school and they took full advantage, observing action in classrooms, offices, the gym and the playground. They observed as our students operated as usual - practicing math facts, delivering oral presentations, participating in discussions with their classmates and teachers, and engaging in active and vibrant prayer, among many other pursuits. Separately, they also met for discussions with parents, our pastor and small groups of students.

Never content to rest on our laurels, the St. Ignatius accreditation team has used the information gleaned from the self-study to write an action plan that will help us focus our growth targets and allot our resources over the next few years.

To give and not to count the cost ...

MAGIS, a Latin word for "more," is at the core of the Jesuit philosophy we teach and live at St. Ignatius. It's about doing more for others, being more; it's about giving and not counting the cost.

At St. Ignatius, Magis is also an organization open to committed 4th through 8th graders, who wish to serve our community and do more for the greater good of our society. Under the supervision of teachers Katie Flores, Becky Del Piero and Trisha Ayers, members of Magis are encouraged to investigate, propose and complete service projects that allow the students to make a direct impact as they share their own gifts. During the organization's events and activities, members have the humbling opportunity to see the face of Christ in others who they might not have had the chance to meet, were they not part of Magis. Of course, the service yields value to both the recipients and the students, and advisors encourage students to get outside of themselves, reflect, and try to find the presence of God in each experience.

Membership in Magis is not exclusive, and Miss Flores is reticent to even call it a club. Aside from the age limit, the only requirement is that each student takes his or her commitment to the group seriously and remember that the people they serve count on them to be reliable.

The students have terrific examples of generosity in the adults around them. Miss Flores, Mrs. Del Piero, and Mrs. Ayers, who volunteer their time to keep the club operational, were delighted last year when Principal Patty Kochis and former faculty member Molly Hagen created the popular adult social event—Trivia Night—and decided that the proceeds should go to Magis. This unexpected funding has been an incredible blessing that has opened up a wide array of opportunities for our students to serve and to do "more" for the greater glory of God.

Serving and Growing

Just a few examples of Magis' student-directed service:

- Students connected with Seniors during monthly Bunco games at Mercy McMahon Terrace
- Students participated in the Mustard Seed Spin to raise money for the Mustard Seed School which helps meet the needs of homeless children.
- Students served hot meals to the hungry, helped those in need select clothing from "the closet," and called BINGO games for their guests' enjoyment at Sharing God's Bounty.
- Students worked together to make pillowcases for cancer patients.
- Students worked together to help children in need by making cozy blankets for the Linus Project and Christmas Caroling at Shriners Hospital for Children.
- Students participated in the "Stop Hunger Now!" meal packaging event. They helped package over 35,000 meals which were shipped to feed people in need.







Transforming Instruction

The pace of change has accelerated in the 21st century, and simultaneously the significance of technology in our lives has exploded. Decision makers at St. Ignatius felt this change upon us and decided to take action. Enter Bob Christensen. With more than 20 years as an educator under his belt and a passion for showing students and grownups alike how to get the most out of technology, this Google-certified tech whiz was exactly what our school was looking for.

Immediately upon joining the faculty, Mr. Christensen and Principal Patty Kochis put together and started to implement a strategic, student-centered plan to create 21st century classrooms and give our students the skills that are critical for success in high school, college, let's face it—in life! The four-point plan, which addresses infrastructure, professional development, student empowerment and effective administration, was also central to the Diocese of Sacramento's decision to award St. Ignatius a \$15,000 grant for technology.

Behind the scenes, the tech team got to work on putting the plan into action. They expanded the school's bandwidth to accommodate an efficient wireless network. And that \$15,000 grant was invested in both iPads and Chromebooks for our students—giving them access to two of today's most commonly-used platforms.

Teachers across campus started attending weekly "Lunch with Bob" workshops where training, planning and troubleshooting ensure that technology is integrated effectively into their instruction in a way that works well for each teacher and each student.

Meanwhile, in the classroom students started using Google Apps for Education (GAFE)—a cloud-based learning platform that allows teachers and students to create, share and edit files from any location on any device. GAFE was such a smashing success in its pilot year that it will now be integrated into subjects beyond technology by the entire staff and all of our 3rd-8th graders.

As basic technology skills are now developed across curricula, students will get to focus on more cuttingedge topics in technology class. Our students will now dig deeper into coding, media literacy, animation, and video production—just to name a few. And, according to the kids this is great news. They're telling their teachers that using tech at SI is, "Awesome," "Fun," "Exciting," even "Advanced."

For a record-setting eighth consecutive year, St. Ignatius School placed first in the Diocese of Sacramento's Junior High Academic Decathlon. No other school in the 26-year history of the event has achieved this unprecedented success.

The Academic Decathlon is a competition among teams from Catholic schools in the diocese. Twenty-four schools took part in the event, which culminates in a 50-question "Super Quiz," where students test their knowledge in five subject areas: science, social studies, literature, fine art and religion. In addition to its unparalleled winning streak, St. Ignatius is the first school in decathlon history to have achieved a perfect score in this event.

This year's victory felt particularly sweet, as we said good-bye to long-time coaches Elisa Arestegui and Carol Walker. These ladies, with the help of other teachers and parents have made an indelible mark on the lives of SI students and our community, in general. We all wish them well as they move on to new adventures!

A Chance to Change a Life

ST. IGNATIUS PARISH SCHOOL provides an education of the whole child, mind, body, and soul. St. Ignatius strives for academic excellence, but more importantly teaches students to fill their world with the "more", or magis, with their presence inspired by faith and justice. Parents choose St. Ignatius knowing their child will receive a Jesuit education and become boys and girls for and with others.

In recent years St. Ignatius has seen an increase in the number of families in our community who require financial assistance to send their child to our parish school. In response to this need, St. Ignatius Parish School will begin an Adopt-a-Student Fund that will provide financial grants for students that will ensure their dream of a Catholic education is realized.

Inaugural support for the Adopt-A-Student Fund was generously donated by family, friends, and loved ones in memory of Lucille Russell (neé Rominger). The family chose to provide the school with the ability to directly impact a deserving student by giving them an opportunity through an education in the Jesuit tradition and environment of St. Ignatius Parish School.

Lucille was a St. Ignatius parishioner and young single working mom, who experienced first-hand the spirit and generosity of the SI community. She made sure her children went to St. Ignatius School so they could benefit from the faith she lived and cherished. Lucille worked hard and was able to send her two oldest children, Matt and Diana through SI. Graduating in 1972, Matt went on to attend Jesuit and in 1974, Diana graduated and attended Loretto.

Unfortunately, when it came time for Lucille to send her youngest son, Tom, to SI, she could not afford the tuition. It was only through the St. Ignatius Loyola Parish and School tuition

assistance program that Tom was able to attend and graduate from SI in 1982. As a result of the generosity of others, Tom went on to graduate from Jesuit, eventually becoming a physician serving the St. Ignatius Community.

Sadly, Lucille passed away in 1996. She was not able to see that four of her grandchildren also graduated from St. Ignatius Parish School - Madeline '08, Lydia '11, Claire '14, and Todd '15.



The Adopt-A-Student Fund is intended to aid students who cannot afford a Catholic school education and accomplish their goal to receive one. Scholarships will be awarded not only on financial need, but also on citizenship and academic merit. Each Adopt-A-Student scholar must adhere to the school's code of conduct and become involved in an extracurricular activity such as a club, service organization, student government, music or athletics. In addition, each family must pay a portion of the tuition fee — creating a true partnership and investment by all.

As a result of the Lucille Russell memorial gift, St. Ignatius Parish School will be able to begin offering assistance through the Adopt-A-Student Fund immediately.














