

There is great excitement about our new facilities, especially as we can see the physical changes on an almost daily basis. The Capital Campaign and all efforts behind it have made our dreams of a new school and parish offices a reality. 

LIVING *a jesuit identity*

Serving others, particularly those who are most easily forgotten or ignored is central to the Jesuit tradition. As we work to grow young men and women for others, St. Ignatius Parish School faculty and staff create opportunities for students to put their faith in action.

Throughout 2016-17, every grade participated in record numbers in our school-wide service projects, collecting food to help *Feed A Family at Christmas* and gathering and donating clothing, toys, diapers, food, and many other essentials for families in need at *Thomas Edison School*, for our *Adopt a Family* program.

Fourth through Seventh graders in our Magis club made blankets for *Project Linus*, an organization that provides blankets to children in need; sang Christmas Carols at *Shriners Hospital*; and helped in an *American River Parkway Cleanup*.

Sharing God's Bounty, a ministry of the parish, provides free, hot meals to those who are hungry in our community, and many students in our upper grades help set up for the event each month – arranging tables, bins of clothing and toiletries, and helping wherever they are needed.

Our youngest students help with *Bounty*, too, by collecting hotel-sized toiletries and bagging them for distribution.

Here's just a sampling of some of the other ways our students served:

Preschool Teachers encouraged their pupils to do small chores at home to raise their own money to donate to the *Children's Leukemia Lymphoma Society Pennies for Patients* campaign.

1st Grade Students held a *Penny Arcade*. When parents came to view their students' speeches on American symbols, they could “activate” the speakers by dropping pennies into a cup. The money collected was then donated to the *Front Street Animal Shelter*.

2nd Grade Students sent handwritten notes and cards to U.S. troops overseas.

the daily examen

A technique of prayerful reflection on the events of the day in order to detect God's presence and discern his direction for us. This is a version of the five-step Daily Examen that St. Ignatius practiced.

1. *Become aware of God's presence*
 2. *Review the day with gratitude*
 3. *Pay attention to your emotions*
 4. *Choose one feature of the day and pray from it*
 5. *Look toward tomorrow*

4th Grade Each student selected a new book to give as a gift and read to a first grader at nearby *Howe School*. They also collected new and gently used books to donate to their new friends' classroom library.

7th Grade Students joined their first grade buddies to sing Christmas Carols at nearby convalescent hospitals.

8th Grade *The Arrupe Project* (more on page 10) is a capstone experience. Students dug deep, researching, praying and ultimately identifying a charity with unmet needs. Then, the kids became personally engaged in meeting those needs, raising money by selling wares in the Arrupe Marketplace at Open House, tutoring younger students, babysitting, even running a dodgeball tournament. Ultimately, the class raised over for \$14,000 for 31 different organizations.

SCIENCE + TECH + ENGINEERING

By now we've all heard about STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) and its significant place in the global economy. In the U.S. alone, experts predict that millions of jobs requiring STEM expertise will go unfilled due to a lack of qualified candidates.

The good news is that STEM education is already a major priority at St. Ignatius. Thanks to generous contributions to our Annual Fund, we are able to have highly qualified teachers leading engaging classes in elementary science, middle school science, technology, and advanced math.


Elementary science teacher, Lisa Schneider, presents lessons that offer hands-on, group challenges and activities that quickly capture her students' interest. The kids learn quickly while having fun. She has a well-earned reputation for being an inspiration to students and parents alike.

Bob Christensen, another favorite and our technology teacher, works across curricula to extend the students' learning by integrating content and assignments from other classes to his lessons. And he knows how to connect with his audience.

Third and fourth graders now get a class called Science Tech once a week in addition to their tech and science classes, where they do things like google drawings to represent photosynthesis with labels, shapes, and images.

FAMILY SCIENCE NIGHT

SI elementary science teacher, Lisa Schneider, recruited experts from nearly 20 different science, technology, and engineering organizations for the second edition of Family Science Night. Many other local professionals were also on site giving SI kids educational and entertaining hands-on experiences that will enhance and help shape a fuller understanding of the topics they explore.

In addition to regular physical education classes, students have the option to participate in a variety of team sports throughout their years at St. Ignatius Parish School.

Beginning in first grade, students can participate in Little Dribblers basketball. Volunteer coaches from our community lead the teams, one for boys and one for girls in each grade, and work to introduce and enhance fundamental skills while reinforcing the kids’ sense of community spirit.

Upper grade athletes compete in a field with 29 other schools in the Parochial Athletic League (PAL) of Sacramento.






