
# Summer Review Packet

- Old Yeller by Fred Gipson



  Use 's when you want to show that something belongs to someone or something. (Example: That is Bozo's clown wig.)
- **Plural possessive** (s') Use s' when something belongs to more than one person. (Example: Those are the **clowns'** wigs.)
- Plural noun (s)
  Use a plain s when you

simply want to show that there is more than one of something. (Example: There are lots of **clowns** in town. They are all wearing **wigs**.)






