

Open to Growth


SI Students are learned, finding God in all things; and wise in the ways they use their learning for the common good.

A Jesuit education encourages students to be curious about everything, active in their engagement with the world, and changing what they can for the better. Classroom lessons are reinforced with special field trips to actually experience the subject.











In Lower Science, the first grade learned about plants at The California State Fair Farm, second grade explored the Biological Sciences department at Sac State, third grade reached for the stars at the The Powerhouse Planetarium, and fourth grade went to a local park to identify trees.

Our individual classes also had special experiences to encourage growth and knowledge. The third grade class spent the day living as a pioneer student at the Rhoad's School built in 1872. In fourth grade the Gold Rush lesson was a living history field trip campout overnight in Coloma. Fifth grade spent the day at the Exploratorium in San Francisco bringing many science concepts to life. Sixth grade went to Sly Park for the week for team building, outdoor adventures, and many opportunities for personal growth. Seventh grade spent three days at the Marin Headlands on the coast for hands-on science and learning experiences. Finally, eighth grade students attended two retreats which helped them to further their relationship with God, their classmates, and themselves.

St. Ignatius Parish School triumphed at the California State Academic Junior High Decathlon. The 2019 State Champions bested close to 700 Catholic schools from California, Nevada and Colorado.

This was the 12th year in a row St. Ignatius Parish School has triumphed at the local competition earning the right to represent the Diocese of Sacramento at the state competition.

On Saturday April 6, the SI Acadeca Team competed against the ten California Catholic schools that had each prevailed at their Diocese Academic Decathlon competitions at St. Pius School in Redwood City.

The St. Ignatius Academic Decathlon team represents a broad spectrum of the school's student body. In addition to their full school academic schedule, they are student council members, members on numerous school and club athletic teams, play piano, altar serve, and are highly involved with various service organizations. These students were able to balance their time studying on weekends, during their lunch recess, in the evenings, and on holidays. Their coaches and parents rearranged their own schedules to be available to support them along the way.




